One girl whose success I want to share is CB alumna Rudaelle (Rudi) Elien. Rudi graduated from Montgomery Blair High School this past spring and is now attending my alma mater, Towson University. During her time in CB Rudi founded her own club, started her own small business, and advocated on behalf of local nonprofits at the Montgomery County Council. After receiving her Towson acceptance letter Rudi sent us this text: "If it wasn't for CB I would have never even applied [to Towson]! Thank you! Also, I received the Comcast Leaders and Achievers Scholarship that I worked so hard on with both Marianne (CB High School Program Manager) and Sydne (CB College and Career Program Manager). Thank you again and again for everything!"

Curled up on her bed in her dorm room at the University of Maryland Baltimore County, Nagnin Aktar may look small but she is a force to be reckoned with. The freshman, who attends the university on a full-ride scholarship, is studying pre-med and business and won't let anything stand in the way of accomplishing her dreams. Nagnin was born and raised in Bangladesh, where she explains that education for girls and women is not always valued. "In Bangladesh people don't expect much from a girl" she writes. "My relatives expected that my male cousins would have their dream careers like engineer, doctor, businessman, etc., while I, as a girl, was expected to stay home, take care of the kids, and cook for the family."

Nagnin's family immigrated to the United States when she was 12 years old. She joined the Community Bridges Girls Program her freshman year of high school and by senior year had become the president of the after-school program at Springbrook High. That same year Nagnin began to research the requirements and process for achieving US citizenship. She knew that without citizenship her and her family's opportunities for success in America might be limited. In February of 2016 Nagnin passed her citizenship test, and now she is coaching her parents through the process as well.

Community Bridges works every day to give girls
like Nagnin the resources and support they need to
make their voices heard. Writes Nagnin, "I believe that

each and every girl has her own voice, and Community Bridges helped me find mine."

Today, Emily Garcia is a student at Montgomery College, where she is pursuing a Studio Art major in the College's School of Art & Design. But just 6 months ago going to college seemed like a dream that might never come true.

Growing up, Emily struggled on and off with juvenile arthritis. Complications from the condition required her to take a significant amount of time off school, setting her back academically and requiring her to repeat her freshman year of high school. Throughout the 2016-2017 school year Emily's family was evicted from their home multiple times and she, her mother, and her two sisters spent the majority of the year homeless. In addition, Emily found out in early 2017 that she would be required to graduate at the end of the spring - a full year earlier than she had expected.



"I was behind in nearly everything," Emily writes. "When I felt overwhelmed and discouraged Community Bridges stepped in. They helped me finish my applications on time, complete FAFSA, prepare my portfolio, and get a paid internship. More than that though, Community Bridges cared about and believed in me, and because of them I believed in myself."

CB mentor/mentee pair Alicia Escoto and Keyla Aguilar Ramos are on a journey to challenge each other, grow together, and have as much fun as possible along the way. The pair, who began their mentoring relationship in 2016, credit each other with the success they've found in their academic, professional, and personal lives. Says Keyla, "The number one thing I've gotten out of our relationship is to never stop pushing yourself." A junior at Montgomery Blair HS, Keyla is taking this lesson to heart by challenging herself to reach new academic goals in her AP English, AP Spanish, and Honors Pre-Calc classes. "If I didn't have Alicia to tell me to 'go for it' then I would have never [pushed myself]."

"I'm really excited to see how much further [Keyla] can grow" says Alicia. "I've told her there are no limits to what she can do and achieve." A mentor with the CB Mentoring Program since 2011, Alicia knows a thing or two about what makes a good mentoring relationship. From attending football games and going out to lunch to having one-on-one homework time and college readiness discussions, Alicia and Keyla support and learn from for each other every day. "One thing I've learned from Keyla is you have to be resilient" says Alicia. "Her courage really inspires me." The pair plans to continue their mentoring relationship throughout the remainder of Keyla's high school experience and for many years to come.




